Assumptions

This plan incorporates the correctional population projection derived for Budget Phase:	<u>Legislature Approved</u>
During the upcoming ten years, the male correctional population will grow annually by:	<u>0.90%</u>
From the beginning to the end of the ten-year horizon, the male population will increase by:	<u>1089</u>
During the same period, the proportion of male inmates not housed at camps or prisons will average:	<u>3.38%</u>

This long-range projection assumes the following:

- Units 7 and 8 at ESP were closed and Unit 12 was vacated due to a water leak during State Fiscal Year (SFY 2019). To offset for the loss of beds, Unit 3 was re-opened ahead of schedule and other beds in Unit 10 were used to house minimum offenders. Units 7, 8, and 12 will be reinstated and Unit 3 will be closed again in November 2019.
- During the 2018-2019 Biennium, the 2017 Legislature approved funding for 200 contracted beds to an outside provider. The 200 inmates and rented beds are included in the model. Submitted in the NDOC SFY 2020-2021 Biennium Agency Request Budget, the agency budgeted for the return of 100 general population inmates beginning in July 2019. During the SFY 2020-2021 Biennium any savings realized from returning all or a portion of the remaining 100 beds would be allowed, with Legislative approval, to be redirected for department costs related to inmate safety and security of the returning inmate population.
- Medium and close emergency overflow beds stay open throughout the ten-year horizon, and select minimum emergency overflow beds are opened and closed as needed.
- Renovation of Unit 8 at SDCC will be completed by the end of SFY 2019.
- Funds for expansions and developments are requested to accommodate the projected increase of 1,089 males. This model requests planning and construction funds for (1) one dormitory at NNCC to house inmates with mental and medical ailments, and (2) an upgraded razor wire fence to be built around the perimeter of TLVCC to secure the camp and house minimum security offenders who are “escape risk” due to their immigration status. The razor wire fence at TLVCC will make it possible to transfer approximately 100 medium custody inmates to this camp, and non-NDF minimum inmates at this camp will be transferred to other minimum camps.
- State Public Works Board (SPWB) is the sole authority to proclaim the life of SDCC Unit 8 beyond the established five years from the date of occupancy in July 2019. SPWB will conduct a facility condition analysis and work collaboratively with NDOC's Chief Engineer to extend the useful life of Unit 8.
- NNCC is undergoing retrofitting work to comply with ADA requirements. Wings in each unit are being upgraded on a rotation basis over a period of 18 months. Emergency overflow beds are utilized to offset the loss of bed capacity.
- The Division of Parole and Probation continues to operate day reporting centers opened during SFY 2018 with the intent to reduce the number of parolees at risk of revocation due to technical violations.
- Parole grant rates increase early in the ten-year horizon and return to historical levels the latter part of the forecast horizon for select crimes. Historically, decreases in parole grant rates were associated with increases in the prison population.

Note: the increase in the projected population derived by the JFA and fluctuation in the prison population will present challenges in maintaining positive bed balances over the ten-year forecast horizon.

All project initiatives that are proposed in this model are hypothetical and assume that the projection will hold true. Strategies stemming
