

The NDOC must be able to identify offenders that fall in various age categories to determine the applicability of laws and regulations that are specific to the individual's actual age. Thus, Beginning with Fiscal Year 2016, age groups no longer encompass ages that are rounded down or up. The change in the methodology is expected to cause a small shift in the frequencies that fall in each group relative to former editions of this report.

The figures in this table represent the distribution of offenders by gender and highest offense across bookings with the NDOC. The highest offense is determined by a hierarchical method applied by the NDOC that consists of grouping instant offenses committed by the offender as per the severity of the offenses. Offenders are placed in the offense group that pertains to the most severe instant offense that he or she has committed.

Data Limitations:

Data published in this report were extracted from a live database; thus, it is possible that figures reported in tables and charts do not balance to totals reported in other reports published by the Nevada Department of Corrections (NDOC). Select distributions consist of estimates and are susceptible to rounding error and missing data that could have caused these distributions not to add up to exactly 100%. Current fiscal year data for the NDOC or for other agencies are not always available at time of edition; consequently, the NDOC performed its best effort to align data accordingly to derived estimates.







Custody Distributions



During Quarter I of Fiscal Year 2015, minimum custody decrease by 1.07% medium custody increased 1.27%, and close custody decreased 2.05% . During Quarter II, minimum custody increased by 1.37%, medium increased by .09%, and close custody by -.86% . The third quarter was marked by decreases of minimum custody of 2.78% and medium custody of 5.13% and increases of close and maximum custody inmates of 12.31% . The fourth quarter brought increases of 3.6% and 3.59% to minimum and medium respectively and a decline of 8.94% to close custody. By the end of the first quarter of Fiscal year 2016, minimum and medium custody decreased by 1.67% and 4.35% respectively and close custody went upwards by 9.74%. During the second quarter close custody declined by 4% and medium custody increased by 2.72%. Minimum custody only declined by .06%. The change in close custody is, in part, attributed to the methodology utilized to account for inmates in administrative segregation.





During Quarter I of Fiscal Year 2015, minimum custody increase .09% , medium custody declined -.77% , and close custody went upwards 3.51% . During Quarter II, minimum custody increased by 6.78% , medium custody decreased by 1.30% , and close custody also decreased more deeply by 4.24% . Quarter III experienced declines of 8.69% in minimum and 5.02% in close custodies and an increase of just .70% in medium custody inmates. In Quarter IV, medium custody increased by 1.69% and minimum and medium decreased by .29% and 8.24% respectively. The first few months of Fiscal Year 2016, a change of trend took place with minimum and close custody increasing by 11.92% and 40.64% respectively and medium custody decreasing by 10.75%. During the second quarter, medium custody increased by .055% and close custody declined by .145%. Minimum custody decline lightly, just -.04%.






Year over year change in male in-house inmates increased at an increasing rate each fiscal year from the end of June 2012 to the end of June 2015. During Fiscal Year 2012, the male population increased by 35 inmates, during Fiscal Year 2013 by 92, and during Fiscal Year 2015 by 133. The first quarter of Fiscal Year 2016 resulted in a loss of 106 males and this change of trend offset a portion of the growth during former years. However, the loss was reversed during the second quarter when the male population gained twice as many offenders.

Year-to-year change of the in-house female population was positive from the beginning of Fiscal Year 2013 to the end of Fiscal Year 2015. Growth was progressive with the female in-house caseload increasing by 17 women during Fiscal Year 2013, 59 in Fiscal Year 2014, and 67 in Fiscal Year 2015. A portion of this growth was offset by a decline of 41 females during the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2016. However, the down trend was reversed in the second quarter when the female population went upwards by 63 women.





Summary of Macroeconomic and Employment Indicators

Protective service occupations is a large occupational group that encompasses various sub-groups, such as police officers, firefighters, animal control workers, and correctional officers.

Nevada is employing, on the average, 37,781 workers in protective service positions. The number of workers in this occupation is expected to increase to 40,617 by the end of Calendar Year 2017.

The estimated number of individuals employed as correctional officers and jailers in Nevada is 2,309, and this number is expected to increase to 2,376 by the end of 2017 and to 2,990 by 2024.

All protective services workers combined in Nevada earn \$15.98 per hour while these workers earn \$18.14 in the U.S. as a whole. The difference translates in an annual salary that is \$4,490 lower than the national.

The hourly wage rate in Nevada is not necessarily lower for each occupation within the protective service class.

Correctional officers and jailers in Nevada earn \$4.61 more than the U.S. as a whole. The difference in the hourly wage translates into an annual salary that is \$9,600 above the national for correctional officers and jailers.

During the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2016, the NDOC added 9 security and 7 non security positions to its workforce. However, the number of authorized positions is constant throughout the fiscal year unless additional FTE are funded by the Legislature.

Overall, the employment outlook for Nevada has improved further relative to the first quarter of this fiscal year with 5,196 additional individuals being employed, and the unemployment rate declining from 6.6% to 6.30%.

*Nevada's population's rate of growth declined from 2.32% in 2010 to less than 1% in 2011. Beginning in 2012 the rate of growth has been gradually trending upwards from 1.26% to 1.71% in 2014 and expected to grow by 1.85% in 2015, a rate that has been almost twice the growth in the U.S.

*According to the Uniform Crime Reporting figures released by the FBI, during Calendar Year 2014, violent crime in Nevada went up by 6.85%, while in the U.S. it went up by .19%. Similarly, murder and manslaughter in Nevada increased 4.29% and in the U.S. only .37%. Robbery increased by 14.88% which is significant relative to a decline of 5.57% in the U.S. as a whole; and aggravated assault increased twice as much in Nevada as in the entire U.S. (5.01% v. 2.37%).

*According to the same source of crime reporting, larceny and property crime declined in Nevada by more than in the U.S. Burglary, however, only declined by half as much in Nevada relative to the U.S. Motor vehicle crime also went into an inverse direction relative to the entire nation as the rate in Nevada jumped 1.87%, and in the U.S. it dropped 1.44%.
